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

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
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Principal's Message



इस वर्ष कोरोना संकट का दौर पूरे विश्व पर छाया रहा। इस संकट से संपूर्ण विश्व की सामाजिक, आर्थिक, राजनीतिक व्यवस्था पर प्रतिकूल प्रभाव भी पड़ा। विश्वविद्यालय और छात्र जीवन इसके कारण गहन संकट में रहा है। छात्रों के लिए यह समय विशेष तनाव का रहा है। इस विकट स्थिति में अध्ययन - अध्यापन की निरंतरता को बनाए रखना बहुत बड़ी चुनौती रही है। सभी पारंपरिक अध्ययन - अध्यापन और परीक्षा के तरीके इस कोरोना के माहौल में संभव नहीं रहे।

विद्यार्थी का महाविद्यालय परिसर में प्रवेश संभव नहीं था; शिक्षक के साथ बैठकर आमने – सामने विषय और व्यक्तिगत समस्याओं की चर्चा भी संभव नहीं थी। पारंपरिक तरीके से परीक्षा भी नहीं हो सकती थी। पिछले वर्ष जिन विद्यार्थियों का कॉलेज में दाखिला हुआ था वह छात्र तो आज तक कॉलेज परिसर को देखने और कालेज जीवन का एहसास तक नहीं कर पाए हैं। कहीं साल खराब ना हो जाए, बदली परिस्थिति में किस तरह अध्ययन करें और परीक्षा दे, डिग्री मिलने के बाद नौकरी और जीवन – यापन से जुड़े सवाल इन सभी प्रश्नों से जूझते छात्रों के लिए यह वर्ष नितांत तनाव और चुनौती का रहा है। बहुत से छात्रों को इस मानसिक तनाव ने डिप्रेशन के कगार पर भी खड़ा कर दिया।

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
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PRABUDDHA VOLUME-1 RELEASE (2020)

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
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ORIENTATION 2021


ACHIEVER'S TALK 1.0: INFORMATION, INSPIRATION AND HOPE

Following this, Ms Surbhi Siwach, IT Head of the society gave a brief introduction of the guest speaker Ms Kadyan.





Ms Kadyan spoke about her journey (being a part of the college). The key idea of her talk was to predict the flow and spread of COVID-19, and the challenges faced by the economic agents. She discussed the dilemma faced by the government - whether to protect the people through lockdown process and halting the infection rates or to save the drowning economy. She discussed in detail the growth curve during COVID-19, and how different sectors were performing. After Ms. Kadyan's address, Dr Prem Kumar and Dr Amit Soni congratulated her on the talk and appreciated her work. The moderator of the event was Dr Amit Soni. The event ended with the vote of thanks given by Dr Rashmi Kumar. She extended a warm gratitude to the guests and humbly acknowledged the presence of all the members and students.

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<u>Virtual Talk: Role of Agribusiness Management in</u> <u>the Economic Development of Rural and Urban India</u>

On 19 September 2020, the Economics Society of Shaheed Bhagat Singh Evening College organised a virtual talk on "Role of Agribusiness Management in the Economic Development of Rural and Urban India". The guest speaker for the event was Professor MK Awasthi. The event started with a welcome address by Dr Prem Kumar. It was followed by an Inaugural address by Honourable Principal Prof SK Sinha. He extended a warm welcome and expressed his gratitude to the guest speaker, faculty members and students. He appreciated the topic chosen for discussion. Following this, Dr Rashmi Kumar, Convenor of The Economics Department, gave a brief introduction of the guest speaker.

Prof Awasthi started his lecture by giving an introduction about agriculture, its importance in the Indian economy, and by explaining how things work in the agricultural sector. He briefly discussed the over-dependence on this sector for all basic needs and the disguised unemployment. He further talked about how food markets are now moving from European markets to Asian and African markets due to unsaturated demand and high profit scope. In today's scenario, we need to consider consumer as the king to achieve maximum profit by fulfilling consumer needs. Then he threw light on the problems faced by farmers. Farmers do not have much exposure to the market being on the other side of the market chain. As a result, they end up getting exploited by middlemen who, in contrast, have all the information of the market. Irrigation is one of the important exercises practiced in agriculture. It requires modern technology and tools for effective working. The tools and equipments are a bit expensive for farmers and as a result farmers end up taking credit. Even after the usage of expensive tools, when the crop fails, the farmer loses not only his money but the debt money as well. This puts farmers in serious debt situations. Prof Awasthi then discussed the three pillars required for a development scheme to work - cost reduction, risk minimization, and profit or price optimization. Then the session turned towards the question answer round. Most of the questions by student were taken up from the chat box. The moderator of the event was Dr Amit Soni, Department of Economics, Shaheed Bhagat Singh Evening College. He smoothly conducted the discussion session and made it very interactive. The speaker diligently addressed the questions and cleared all doubts. The session ended by presentation of a digital memento to the esteemed speaker and Honourable Principal. The event ended with a warm vote of thanks extended by Ms Shikha Solanki.

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ECOBUZZ 2020-21

Do you think removal of the Agriculture Produce Market Committee system will exploit the farmers or benefit them? 10. Summarise the new Agriculture bill and compare it with the previous one.

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4th Edition: National Young Economists Conclave (NYEC)

The NYEC is organised by the Department of Economics. The main objective of the conclave is to provide undergraduate students a platform to showcase their research skills and analytical views on economic issues. Undergraduate students of all recognised universities and institutions across India are invited to submit original research papers and present on the themes relevant to the conclave. This year the event was held on 12, 13 March 2021. There were three rounds. In the first round, the participants had to submit an abstract of their research paper. We received 150 abstracts from all over India. For the second round, the participants had to submit their full research paper, on the basis of which participants were selected for the final round. In all 41 research papers were selected and the selected participants presented their paper via digital mode on 12 March in four technical sessions divided under four different broad topics: 1. Social and Economic issues 2. Banking and Finance 3. Covid-19 4. Education, Health, Digital The best three papers were awarded with cash prize of Rs 10,000, Rs 7,500 and Rs 5000. Participants were also given paper presentation certificates and the best interjector was also given a certificate. Consolation prizes were awarded in each technical session. On 13 March 2021, prize distribution and Valedictory ceremony took place with Prof VK Kaul, Head, Department of Business Economics, University of Delhi, as the chief guest. He delivered a valedictory speech and discussed a wide range of topics primarily focusing on Covid-19 and the world after the pandemic, India's role in helping the world in tackling COVID-19, globalization, etc. The hosts thanked him for his wonderful words and for his presence.


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DEPARTMENT OF GEOGRAPHY








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Educational Tour (Semester Six):



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

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
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HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR-





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WEBSITE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

An accessible and approachable website is vital for any institution in the present era. In case of educational institution, it becomes all the more crucial as they need to provide information for existing and prospective students, their parents, faculties and alumni. They often need to include reams of information in a way that makes explore, especially when everything easy to communication has become very important during the pandemic. With commencement of the new academic session 2020-21, the consequences that pandemic brought with it led to the shutdown of colleges and institutions worldwide in the physical mode. This increased the dependency of the educational institutions, existing and new students more on the internet for imparting and extracting the needed information. Therefore, to meet the new challenges the need for revamping the existing website was envisaged. The already active Website Management Committee was, therefore, expanded to refurbish the website of the college.

In October 2020, revamping of the website was officially approved and the Website Management Committee was constituted with **Dr Amit Soni** as Convenor and **Ms Savita Kiran** as Co-Convenor. We approached Dr Anupama M Hasija, a senior colleague to be a member of this committee and she readily gave the consent to share her experience and expertise for the work at hand. Senior System Administrator (SSA) of the college **Mr Chirag Malik**, as might be expected, is an integral part of the work. We have also been consulting the principal, Prof Sudhir Kumar Sinha who has been a guiding force behind this project. His enthusiasm, guidance and trust in the team has been inspirational.

The core team was formed consisting of these three faculty members

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members, SSA and five student volunteers Aryan Raj, Ankit Mishra, Ayush Sharma, Ashmita Verma and Pranjal Shrivastava who had shown keen interest in the work. The team prepared a design for the new website after careful deliberations. Wireframe for each page was designed and tabs and subtabs for the entire website were determined.



After this initial work was done and the vendor was finalized, the humongous task of collecting data was addressed. For this, WMC collaborated with the HoDs of various departments and a liaison officer was appointed from each department to ensure the availability of required departmental information in a time-bound manner. Dr Amrita Kaur, Dr Amit Soni, Dr Anupama M. Hasija, Mr Jeetendra Kumar, Ms Savita Kiran, Dr Suman Swami, Mr Pankaj Bahot and Dr Anil Kumar from Department of Commerce, Economics, Geography, Political Science, English, Hindi, History and Physical Education respectively were the liaison officers. Ms. Shivali Veen and Ms. Suzanee Malhotra coordinated with Dr Amrita Kaur to provide the information related to the department of Commerce. Along with that, an editorial board consisting of faculty members Ms Pooja Sharma, Ms Tina Borah and Ms Shuchita Tripathi and existing students from various departments with lateral entry of Himanshu Chauhan, 3rd Year was formed to look after the content of the website. By January 2021, the wireframes were developed and the work for content of each section began. 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


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THE ENGLISH LITERARY AND LANGUAGE SOCIETY

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
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ENACTUS NATIONALS 2020

Our team participated in the Enactus nationals for the academic session 2019-20. Our team qualified the project selection round and made a presentation video which was published on Enactus national website for open voting, it was a tough fight between teams for securing top four places in the national finals. Due to the pandemic most of the events and projects were executed through online platforms. Enactus SBSEC conducted its first digital project along with numerous webinars. Here is a quick summary:

Projects Initiated

- ❖ Project Lakshya: Project Lakshya, ENACTUS SBSEC's first digital project is about imparting knowledge and educating unprivileged children of the age group 7-14 through online means. Inactus team volunteered to teach children in their neighborhood. In February the society collaborated with Rehabilitation Society of Visually Impaired (RSVI), an NGO for the upliftment of people with visually impairment. Inactus provided online sessions to students with visual impairment. At online sessions, Inactus volunteers guided students for their college and job interviews. The sessions included tips regarding dress code, common questions and their answers, how to conduct oneself etc. The session was a great success as participants engaged in discussions and cleared their doubts.
- ❖ Project Chitrakari: Project Chitrakari is an initiative for sustainable business development through which Inactus aims to improve the lives of the marginalised and downtrodden by providing them employment at their doorstep. Under this project, members process kulhads into customized cups and planters for cafes and gift shops. They also recycle used cloth by making bags out of it. So far, Inactus has purchased Kulhads and finalised Lakshyam NGO and delivered it for processing. In the near future, Inactus plans to arrive at an arrangement with certain cafes and restaurants to establish a well-structured supply chain for products. The vision is to serve every café with Inactus product so that routine plastic waste can be cut down by providing biodegradable product that will not only save the environment but also improve people's health.
- ❖ Project Podtalk: Project Podtalk is an initiative through which Enactus aims to engage listeners in long-form meaningful content around entrepreneurship and issues of current importance. So far, Inactus has hosted two guests on its podcast McArthur fellow Mr Jim Frutcherman and President of IYEA Mr Ajay Sabharwal. In the future Inactus would like to bring more entrepreneurs as guests and would share their stories that may inspire others to startup and contribute to the society. As our motto says, we bring out stories that matter.









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
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Events Conducted:




2. TRADESTA:






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PARTICIPATION IN EK BHARAT SHRESHTH BHARAT CAMPS

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
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SHAHEEDI DIWAS (MARTYR'S DAY)

In the end there was a question and answer session and a vote of thanks. Over 120 students from 40 colleges attended the session and the event was an immense accomplishment for the unit.



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
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<u>Tilak Utsav And Ambedkar Jayanti</u>

On the occasion of Tika Utsav and Ambedkar Jayanti from 11-14 April the NSS Unit organised a series of social events to create awareness about the ongoing vaccination process.

•Tika Utsav was organised across the country from April 11-14 to fight against the pandemic. On this occasion, the NSS Unit hosted a set of activities. The celebration began with volunteers making videos about sanitizing, requesting people above 45 years of age to get vaccinated and creating awareness to stop the spread of the virus. Volunteers contributed creatively through posters and videos to sensitize people and fight against Covid-19. The volunteers also tried to spread awareness regarding vaccination process by going door to door while taking necessary precautions.





- All the volunteers were involved in 'Tika Utsav' against Covid-19. They chanted slogans in different languages and used them in handmade posters as well. They appealed to people to register and book an appointment online.
- With 11 April being celebrated as the birth anniversary of Jyotiba Phule and the 14 April being celebrated as the birth anniversary of Baba Saheb Ambedkar, the NSS unit urged the youth to come forward and help senior citizens and others in registering for Covid-19 vaccination. The unit volunteers assured people that immunization can save millions of lives and is widely recognized as one of the world's most successful and cost-effective health interventions. The goal of world immunization week was to urge greater action on immunization.
- During this four-day vaccination drive, targets were set at personal, societal and administration's level, and all efforts were made to meet them. The NSS unit marked the 'Mass Vaccination' Program till 14 April.

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At the peak of the pandemic era when people were desperately looking for oxygen cylinders, hospital beds, ventilators, medicines, etc. some unscrupulous elements were also taking advantage to make profit. In such a scenario, the NSS Unit of SBSEC worked day and night to save humanity.

Understanding the dire situation in the wake of Covid-19, NSS volunteers of the college unit started a campaign 'Mission Save Humanity'. Under this, they provided verified sources of oxygen cylinders, hospital beds, ventilator beds, ICU beds, doctors' numbers, ambulance services, and other Covid related essentials such as medicines, plasma, and even free food.

More than 20 NSS volunteers worked for over 13-14 hours to gather, disseminate and propagate the verified sources of all the items.

During this period, the NSS unit volunteers helped more than 700 affected people in Delhi-NCR through this initiative. Volunteers used social media platforms like Instagram, Twitter, Facebook, and WhatsApp, for this purpose.

The NSS and its team believe that health care and frontline workers silently formed the first line of defence in the face of Covid-19. The mantle falls on the youth therefore to strengthen the efforts of health works by helping people in needs. 
The society also accepted **Pass the Camera Challenge**, which received excellent response on social media.

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2020-21 EVENTS


This was the very first academic year of SDC and members conducted some remarkable events and activities:






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
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5. JAM: Just a Minute



Till date we have placed more than 600 students through the campus and off campus drives.




Hierarchy & Responsibility Distribution Chart The Placement Cell

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
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Why to join us & Who can join us?

The Placement Cell provides the perfect mix of professional and personal development. It enhances your networks, body language, confidence, communication skills and your perspective towards day to day tasks with a better clarity of the corporates. Students from all courses of First Year & Second Year are welcomed to be a part of The Placement Cell every year. The students have to appear for the tough selection process criteria and only a few are taken in every year. The selection ratio of the Cell is approximately 1:25 i.e. for every 25 students, 1 student is selected. This is enough to justify the standard of work that has to be delivered and the importance of the work that The Placement Cell is committed to.





- During the first half of the academic Session 2020-21, a majority of the students who were placed belonged to the previous batch due to sudden change in demand of the corporates, a result of the Corona Virus Pandemic.
- Additionally, the campus placement drives for EY GDS (in progress), Byjus, Concentrix, have been already finalized for the month of April & May for the Batch of 2021.
- More than 120 students were placed. Gross Value of Employment Generated in the academic session 2020-21 by the Cell: INR 8.4 Crore. Highest package stands at INR 21,00,000 Lakhs p.a.

More than 7000 students participated in GSM 2020 across India and our students namely, Gurpreet S. Chandok (3rd Year), Simran Chopra (3rd Year), Yash Khandelwal (2nd Year), Aaradhya Bansal (2nd Year) as a team 'Les Formidables' made it to the finals by clearing four rounds consisting of the Finance test, Aptitude Test, and two case study rounds and made it into the Top-5 Positions across India.
- EY CAFTA CC Case Study Competition: EY CAFTA is a Treasury and Finance certification course focusing on combining theory, practice, experience, and talent. The case study competition was a national-level event, based on modern Finance problems. More than 2000 students participated in EY CAFTA CC 2020 and our students namely, Yash Khandelwal (2nd Year), Shruti Rani (2nd Year) as a team named "Team Falcons" stood runner-up all across the India in their respective category. 

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
13TH FEBRUARY 2021 NATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY


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An Ideal World: A Perfect Myth

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Environmental Contamination: A Social Issue

Humans are eating away their own life support systems at a rate unseen in the past 10,000 years by degrading land and freshwater systems, emitting greenhouse gases and releasing vast amounts of agricultural chemicals into the environment. The current energy model is worsening not only air pollution by the burning of fuel, increasing the CO_2 emissions which cause global warming but has also led to the worsening of climate change.

Climate change has had extreme impacts in India. A study conducted by the *Indian Institute of Technology, Gandhinagar*, had predicted an increase in extreme rainfall events in Southern and Central India and had linked it to global warming due to climate change. Rise in average global temperatures have led to a worrying trend of no rain for long periods and then a sudden bout of excessive rainfall, causing extreme weather events, particularly floods which took lives, destroyed homes and agricultural yields.

A report from a research by 35 global institutions, listed a number of ways climate change threatens fisheries and aquaculture. It not only leads to rise in sea-surface temperature rise and more intense and frequent extreme-weather events but also ocean acidification. This will lead to contamination of fishes which provides one fifth of animal protein to 5.2 billion people, especially those in low-income and middle-income countries. There will be a spike in various infections such as- cholera, gastroenteritis, wound infections and several others in India due to increased sea surface temperature. The report also warned that children will be among the most to suffer from the rise in infectious diseases — with climatic suitability for the vibrio bacteria that cause cholera rising 3 per cent a year in India since the early 1980s. Mortality due to vector-borne diseases such as dengue will rise because of rising temperatures globally.

Another study conducted by the *Climate Impact Lab* in collaboration with the *Tata Centre for Development at the University of Chicago* has projected that 1.5million more Indians may die per year from extreme heat due to climate change by 2100, and that India's energy use will more than double in the next 20 years, driven largely by fossil fuels. Their report titled "The study, Climate Change and Heat-Induced Mortality in India" suggests

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emissions continue to be as high as they are at present, India will see a death rate of about 60 percent 100,000 by 2100, the study says. This projected death rate is about the current death rate from oral cancer in India, which is the most common cancer in the country. It also estimated that the average annual temperature in India is expected to increase from 24-degree C to 28-degree C. The number of extremely hot days (above 35 degree C) across India is expected to increase by over eight times, from 5.1 per year in 2010 to 42.8 in 2100.By 2050, there are expected to be 15.8 extremely hot days a year. The National Capital Region is projected to see 22 times more extremely hot days and more than 23,000 climate-related deaths annually by 2100 in a high-emission scenario. Odisha is projected to see the highest increase in the number of extremely hot days, at about 30 times more than what it is today. Punjab is projected to experience 85 extremely hot days a year, the highest among all states. According to the same report, the risks associated with extreme temperatures vary around the world and are dependent upon the wealth of a country.

For instance, the impact of a single hot day on the annual mortality rate of a wealthy and warm city such as Houstan, US, will be 0.4deaths per 100,000. The same will be double for a warm and poorer city such as Delhi, at 0.8 deaths per 100,000.

Taking its toll all over the life forms, it has even targeted fauna. More than 5000 birds have buried and so far more than 10 thousand birds are estimated to have died, 25 species of birds have been victims of premature death and which include migratory birds as well at Sambhar Lake, the *Indian Express* reported. Meanwhile, the generation of other pollutants, such as nitrogen oxides (NO and NO_2), sulfur oxides (SO_2 and SO_3) and particulate matter, are contaminating the air. Atmospheric pollution causes six million deaths a year worldwide and a quarter of lung cancer cases, heart attacks and strokes. This pollution and heat stress will not take its toll only on childhood due to the Dangerous levels of outdoor fine particulate air pollution (PM 2.5) which had contributed to over 529,500 premature deaths in the country in environmental contamination will continue to affect people lifelong, certainly adversely affect their life expectancy and other demographic indicators.

In the past few years, there has been a growing fear about a possible consequence of climate change: zombie pathogens. Specifically,

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bacteria and viruses preserved for centuries in frozen ground coming back to life as the Arctic's permafrost starts to thaw. A heat wave in the Arctic thawed a thick layer of the permafrost, and a bunch of reindeer carcasses started to warm up. The animals had died of anthrax, and as their bodies thawed, so did the bacteria. Anthrax spores spread across the Tundra region leading to human casualty. What pathogen would be next? Smallpox? The 1918 flu? *The Atlantic* wrote in November 2020 that climate change has the ability to awaken earth's forgotten pathogens, of these pathogens some may be able to survive a gentle thaw and if they do, researchers warn, they could reinfect humanity.

Climate change is melting permafrost soils that have been solid for thousands of years, and as the soils melt they have the potential to release ancient viruses and bacteria that may be capable of springing back to life. The need of the hour is an invention that uses solar energy to consume carbon dioxide and release oxygen along with a useful residue. This invention was gifted by Mother Nature to us years back from the beginning of life in plenty of amount, which we are destroying, indeed "trees". These trees will not only promote evapotranspiration, reduces wind velocity, their foliage absorbs sun rays which reduces convection and keeps moderate temperatures and the list goes on. We need to stop deforestation and begin afforestation. It's not that afforestation is a new concept but now we need to do it effectively. Government authorities plant saplings, but those are not taken care of properly as a result of which their survival chances are least. As a part of this society we need to not only take care of those plants but also grow more plants whenever and wherever possible, be it gardens, balcony, roof of the house etc. Our small measures will bring a big change in no time if we all do this together not by any compulsion but voluntarily.

But the situation worsened when Bihar was partitioned from Bengal by the Britishers in 1912. This marked the real beginning of Bihar's deterioration. Anyhow after the independence of India in 1947 the state of Bihar tried to establish itself and regain its lost valour but it did not become successful in doing so. Bihar has seen several ups



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and downs, leaving it with nothing except for a strong hope towards development.

India after 2019: A tale from "Democracy to Judicial-ocracy"

After the 'historic' win of the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) in the General Elections of 2019, with a total of 352 seats in the Lower House of the Country, a lot of developments have happened. Many laws were passed, many policies were changed, many development projects approved, many



reforms initiated and what not. Changes and transitions have happened in political, educational, developmental, medical and defense fields too. But there is a specific 'transition' that has happened in the very functioning of our country and that is, the 'democracy ruled' India has transitioned into a 'judiciary ruled' India, and it is a problematic happening. In every country there is a procedure to make a law. India too has its own. It involves passing of a Bill in the Lok Sabha, followed by passing in the Rajya Sabha and finally signed by The President of India. For decades, there has been no set role of the judiciary in law making. But in recent laws post 2019 win, the judiciary has acquired a very active and somewhat unwanted role in the process of law-making.

A new step, unwanted and unnecessary, has been added to the process by 'some people' and that step is newly made laws being challenged in the courts of law. Now moving ahead are some prominent examples of this futile power being used. These were not 'some' bills that were going to be passed, these were actual laws already passed by the Parliament.

Starting with, The Triple Talaq Bill, passed in July, 2019 in the Rajya Sabha which aimed at safe-guarding Muslim women and giving them equal rights in a marriage. This Law was challenged by a Sunni Muslim Group (scholars and clerics) of Kerala in the Supreme Court. They termed the law 'unconstitutional). This was an unwanted move which did nothing but wasted the precious time of the court and mocked the "democratically' elected Government. By the way,

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the case is still pending. Moving on, the National Investigation Agency or the NIA (Amendment) Bill and the Jammu and Kashmir Reorganization Bill, 2019. Both bills were passed by the Parliament and signed by the President. The NIA Bill aimed at increasing the powers of the Agency which was already being planned by the Manmohan Singh led-government in 2008. The J&K Reorganization Bill aimed at bifurcating the state into two Union Territories for better administration and governance. Both passed bills were challenged in the SC. While the plea on NIA (Amendment) Bill was accepted by the Supreme Court, the plea on J&K Reorganization Bill was rightfully rejected.

Lastly, the 'infamous' Citizenship Amendment Act 2019 and the Three Farm Laws 2020. Both the laws were challenged in the Supreme Court of the Country. And what followed after shook the country. Both the laws created havoc in the country and abroad. In the name of protests against CAA, the never ending Shaheen Bagh Sit-in Protest created a lot of problems in the Delhi NCR region. The whole country was in a state of unrest.

Followed by the violence in Jawaharlal Nehru University, Aligarh Muslim University and Jamia Milia Islamia University shook the country. These incidents brought great shame and humiliation for the country. But, for what? For a law passed by a 'Democratically elected government' whom the citizens of the country rightfully chose as their representatives. Now, the same unruly, violent protests are happening against the Three Farm Laws. Same violence, same disruption, same wastage of manpower and money, and above all Loss of Lives. The Republic Day 2021 Violence has done nothing but critically disrupted the country.

With the above things being said, I am not against any actual protest or the challenging of any law in the courts. But it should all be done in a peaceful and non-hurtful manner. People need to understand that supporting any violent and unlawful activity or protest will do no good for the country but will only serve a ground for power-hungry politicians to politicize the issue and cause unrest in the country. Protest in a peaceful manner, demand repeal of any law by the government but all in a non-violent manner without causing any problem to anybody. And if it still doesn't work out, well, then five years are not that long. Change the government, democratically.

Not only the society it's also the government who doesn't take care for their youth population and get concerned for youth. According

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

Each one of us has our own identity and everybody deserves to be respected and treated with love. Let's make equality a tradition and respect our culture.







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
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Artificial Intelligence: Wonders and Vulnerabilities
